Emergency Medical Service

\$15 Million Given to Project

Omaha — "I guess you could say EMS (Emergency Medical Service) is still not exactly a common household word, but it's getting there."

This is how Dr. Bernard P. Harrison, Chicago, opened the first of four national Robert Wood Johnson Foundation conferences in Omaha Thursday. The other three will be in Atlanta, New York and Los Angeles later this month.

The relationship between Dr. Harrison's comment as the American Medical Assn. (AMA) medical practice division director and EMS being a household word was clarified when it was reported the foundation is giving \$15 million in grants to 44 EMS projects this year.

More than 200 applications were received for the \$15 million. One came from central Nebraska which includes the cities of Hastings, Grand Island and Kearney.

According to Blair Sadler, Princeton, N.Y., assistant vice president to the Johnson Foundation, 22 of the 44 approved projects came from city and county government or state health departments. Only one was from a medical school.

City, county and state governments, in Sadler's opinion, may be accelerating recognition of their responsibility for providing EMS "as a third public program after fire and police protection."

Assignment of Nebraska Court
 Administrator James Dunlevey
 to a legislative committee to
 assist on bill drafting work is not
 a conflict of interest, according
 to Chief Justice Paul White.

Yet White said "this is the
 only time it's ever going to

Dunlevey was authorized to
 lend a drafting hand to the
 Unicameral's Judiciary Com-
 mittee in its effort to wrap up
 work on a comprehensive revi-
 sion of the state's criminal code,
 LB8.

Dunlevey at one time was a
 legislative employe specializing
 in bill drafting work.

Reportedly, the chief justice
 at first balked at the Judiciary
 Committee's request, but sub-
 sequently changed his mind.



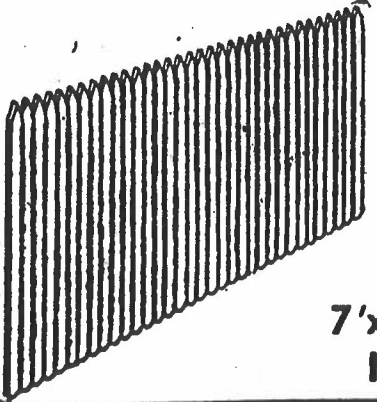


Iowan Dies of Injuries After Car-Truck Crash

Scandinavia Freedom I

Scandinavian countries enjoy the same kind of freedom and "about the same amount," as the United States, but they achieve freedom in a different way.
 Arne Sorensen, former member of the Danish parliament and later of the first free cabinet after the war, explained this seeming paradox to members of Our Saviour's Lutheran church and Danish brotherhood lodge at the Student Union Saturday night.
 Mr. Sorensen, who is currently on tour of the United States, said the political mixture which permits freedoms to exist in countries largely socialistic is both "undefinable and unorthodox."
