I will state that the winter of 1876 + 1877  
while I was employed by Gay Deer at  
Camp Condy, near Red Cloud Agency.

J. W. Deer was Indian Trader at the Agency  
and Frank Yates was Indian Agent at that  
time.

I knew Chief Red Cloud, American Horse  
Chief Friday of the Arapaho Tribe

Crazy Horse surrenders with his Tribe  
at the Agency. Jan 1/1877.

It was a grand sight to see them coming  
in. You know they travel single file  
and it took 3 to 4 hours before the last one  
arrived. They camped along White River  
where Crawford now stands.

all I know about Chief Red Cloud is, that he led the Attack on Lt Fetterman, in charge of Wagon Train hauling wood. for Fort Phil Kearney Wyo and every one was killed. I think it was in 1867

at the Agency he was Peacefull did not have much to say, he knew they had to submit to the U.S. Army and make the best of it.

he like a drink of whiskey (Winnemunka) when he could get it, for it never made him wild, he liked it.

I believe Yellow Bird was Chief of the Cheyenne Indians, I often visit them, for one half Breed girl could talk English, she would tell me about their Trib, they were in the Battle against Gen Carter. June 25/1876 they were transferred to Indian Territory in the spring of 1877

Chief Friday of the Arapahoe  
Tribe. could talk our Language  
very well. he said as a small boy  
he went to school at St Louis. Mo  
but he liked the wild life better  
they are not a Clean tribe.

Mr Sheldon. I will write you my  
life at Red Cloud Agency in 1876 + 1877  
after that about Wyoming. my  
Experience and what I done from  
the fall of 1876 to 1883 when I  
returned to Omaha. which was  
always my home

June 25/1876. they were transferred to Indian Territory in the spring of 1877.

Cheif Friday of the Arapahoe tribe could talk our language very well. he said as a small boy he went to school at St Louis. Mo but he liked the wild life better. they are not a clean tribe. Mr. Sheldon, I will write you my life at Red Cloud Agency, in 1876 & 1877 after that about Wyoming, my experience and what I done from the fall of 1876 to 1883 when I returned to Omaha, which was always my home.
