Christian Ministry to Service Men, Council of Churches of Maryland and Delaware since November 1941. During that period, largely through his efforts in that capacity, that organization reached over one million service men and women of all creeds and color, providing free sleeping facilities for over 100,000 and more than 122,000 free meals. Entertainment, books, magazines, radios, pianos and recreational facilities were made available to thousands of others, and 1068 wives of service men were placed in church homes. Seventy-eight ships were supplied with phonographs, records and other recreational supplies. The Reverend Wyland's services and that of the organizations in the Council were entirely gratuitous and have been of inestimable value from a morale as well as spiritual standpoint.

A Fitting Tribute To Dr. Wyland

The testimonial dinner given Dr. Ben Wyland by the United Churches of St. Petersburg last week is a fitting tribute to the leadership that he has exerted in the never-ending fight to keep St. Petersburg the state's cleanest city.

And Dr. Wyland's decision to move up to the executive secretaryship of the Florida Council of Racial Cooperation will give that group a solid and dedicated leader in its effort to solve one of the South's greatest problems through the medium of goodwill and Christian principles.

ST. PETERSBURG IS A better place because of the 10 years service Dr. Wyland has given here. He proved himself a good organizer and a fearless combatant in the campaign of the churches to restrict the liquor sale zone, the battle against summer racing and the appeal before the State Pardon Board to spare the life of Walter Lee Irvin in the Groveland rape case.

His activities — and those of the United Churches which he brought from humble beginnings to a cooperative effort by 65 churches — have included a Korean clothing campaign on Hal-

loween, the mammoth mass religious service at Al Lang Field for the dedication of Sunshine Skyway, work for Goodwill Industries, putting the Negro Community Chest campaign over the top, work in setting up a Negro Youth Center, securing a home for Lauffer Branch YWCA for Negro girls, housing 1,500 Negro educators who conventioned here, direction of the Easter Sunrise services, now a major event in St. Petersburg, and numerous other services.


THE STATURE OF the man has been recognized by the National Council of Churches which has drafted him three times as an exchange preacher to England. He has received many other citations and awards.

In retiring from the position as executive secretary of United Churches, he said his deepest sympathies lie in the field of racial cooperation and the challenge of the new job renders greater public service possibilities. He will remain in St. Petersburg and, as he said, serve here in every good cause.

Pastor Congregational Churches at Worcester, Mass.; Brooklyn, N. Y.; built the million dollar church at Lincoln, Nebraska, with Carillon.

Liaison Chaplain at Baltimore during World War II for Council of Churches and the Churches of America. Work written up by the Saturday Evening Post and received Citation from the Third Army Corps.

An exchange preacher three times under the National Council of Churches with England. In 1954 preached in Worcester Cathedral by approval of the Archbishop of Canterbury. Attended Queen's Garden Party. This summer (1956) will preach in England again, arrangements having been made in Edinburgh, Canongate—the church of the Royal Family, and is returning to Worcester Cathedral, and also in London.

For 2 years placed in charge of Korean clothing campaign by the Hallowe'en Civic Committee using school children, diverting them from mischief to do good deeds. Secured 30,000 pounds of clothing and a transport plane from President Eisenhower to Baltimore for overseas shipment.

When new \$23,000,000 Skyway Bridge was completed over Tampa Bay and dedicated, he was placed in charge of a Mass meeting at Al Lang Field. General Chairman and President of the Florida Power Co., Mr. William Clapp said, "A mighty fine job you did".

A member of Public Relations Committee, South East Conference (Atlanta) of National Council of Churches.

A member of Public Relations Committee of Good Will Industries, St. Petersburg.

Had charge of public relations with churches for former President, the Honorable Herbert Hoover in his last food campaign.

Received citation from Bethune-Cookman College for service to Negro people.

Received Honor Citation from Negro YMCA—Melrose Branch, from National YMCA for service to Negro people.

As Executive Secretary of the United Churches, Negro churches and ministers were made members.

Received Nathaniel Colyer Award from Florida Normal for work for Negro people.

Given B'nai Brith Award by Jewish Community.

As Chairman of Negro Division of the Community Chest received an Oscar when they went over top in 1954 and 1955. Mr. J. E. Bryan, President of Union Trust and Chairman of the Community Chest, said "I should like to express to you my sincere appreciation for the fine job you have done with the Negro Division of the Community Chest. You have done a wonderful job". The Times editorially referred to it as "Proud Leadership".

Received degree Doctor of Humane Letters, Edward Waters College, for Interracial contributions.

For three years Chairman Rockefeller National financial campaign in Pinellas County for 30 accredited Negro colleges.

Given honor citations Armistice Day, 1955, by the American Legion and the Veterans Council for Civic and Racial Betterment.

Received thanks from City Council of St. Petersburg for work in Negro area to set up a youth center.

Secured Home for Lauffler Branch YWCA now handling 700 Negro girls yearly. House bought from the City for One Dollar. Secured cooperation of both newspapers and prominent citizens, together with cooperation of free labor from Labor Unions for overhauling the house. Raised \$5,000 to move, relocate and repair.

Conducted successful campaign to house 1,500 Negro educators barred from local hotels. Secured thru cooperation from President Eisenhower 1,500 cots from nearby air base, used churches, used private white and Negro homes. Supported by Chamber of Commerce and Hotel Men's Association. Carried affair thru without incidents.

Spearheaded for the churches the campaign to save Walter Lee Irwin from death sentence which was successful. Secured new evidence in Lake County with the help of the former Prosecuting Attorney, Jesse Hunter. This was done in unison with the magnificent work of the St. Petersburg Times.

Directed the Annual Easter Sunrise Services in Al Lang Field growing to attendance of 10,000 people. Handled the largest public gathering in the history of the City—The Billy Graham Mass Meeting with 35,000 present. Annually organized the Good Friday and Union Thanksgiving services.

Built the United Churches from its beginning to its present cooperation of 65 churches.

The Sunday School Parade—four hours long—he brought to the City.

On moral issues he mobilized the community to defeat another dog track and to keep liquor interests under control.

The Chapel at Mound Park Hospital he mobilized church forces to bring to pass.

A TV and Radio Workshop was established.

Directed repeatedly Mass Meetings at Williams Park for the American Legion, The United Nations, and Brotherhood Week.

Wyland, who later Sunday evening accepted a citation from Lauffer Branch YWCA for "humanitarian service to the Negro people," is former executive secretary of the United Churches of Greater St. Petersburg and is currently president of the Florida Council for Racial Cooperation.
