Lalla has four children now her last, a boy was born two days before our son. Howard and Grace are still with Mother. Lalla and the two little ones will be out this fall to spend the winter.

I can't say what the prospects are for a move, the sooner the better, to please me, but to me, it looks as though it would take some time to get things in shape to leave here.

John expects to go up to Cheyenne soon, I believe, hope he will think as much of the city as Walter did.
