My dear Sister

It is so long since I have written anything  
a letter to know where to commence, therefore I shall start  
in just as if I had been worthy recently. The more  
magnificently autumn is in your last letter telling of the Addison  
celebration. We here had another dry season as usual  
but as there was very little seed planted and the table  
land and as no one expected much from dry farms,  
we are not disengaged men of the farms here  
left and those who are still here and expect to  
remain soon give up farm and go into  
cattle raising and ~~and~~ milking for the Creamery;  
some have moved down to the bottom and more  
expert in the irrigation ditch are having a success  
and there will be considerable irrigated farms  
under our ditch next season. About every body  
out here has lost all their enthausiasm and are about  
ready to give up. At the present price of grain and  
for products the farmers are about as well off with  
no crops as with big ones. Date for maturity at the  
present price will hardly pay the expense of threshing

and hunting too much so that the farmer in the eastern part of Nebraska when they have a tremendous crop are not much better off than we are here, and then they don't know how to live on wind and hope as well as we do.

For the last two months we have been all stirred up over politics, and no wonder we are for Nebraskans seem to storm center, and as an old fellow who lives out north of town said in the storm the other day Nebraska has more stations to the acre than bushels of corn, and it would seem now with Senator Thurston as ~~the~~ principle ruling spirit of the Rep with Mr. Denton of Lincoln, Mr. Bent of the Convict at Sh. Louis, and Mr. Doolittle of Lincoln, the nomination of the Bitter Creek Bank Convict for Governor and Senator Allen of Neb. and our boy creation with the big mouth and brain chink the nominee at Chicago, and Senator Allen Chairman of the Sh. Louis Pop forces and now a possibility of the sound money Democratic nomination our section of Standing Rock, we as a state seem to be in it. Before Bryan was nominated it was looked upon as a sure thing that McKinley would carry Neb by June 20 the 40 thousand and now it looks as if cheap money and the Popocrats would ~~safely~~ carry every thing before them.

The Republicans are picking up a good <sup>State</sup> ticket and declared for sound money, and now the Pop and Democrats have joined and a late of Return Republicans were gone with them, our candidate for Gov John H. McCull is an old friend of ours who lives at Lexington and is a miller we have bought flour of him for the last ten years.

Our candidate for Congress is one of the brightest men in the State as good a orator as Bryan and far more logical and better fitted and broader minded he has been a newspaper man, banker, and is now in the ~~the~~ wholesale grocery business in St Paul, and by the way, is the president of the bank at Elba of which Jim Brown is the cashier.

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His name is Ed Cady he and Bassett have been partners  
for about five years and I know him Cady Journal  
for five or six years. It is very doubtful if  
either of these men can be elected this year as they are  
both of them too honest not to openly for honest money.  
The reputation of this 54<sup>th</sup> Legislature destrich comprising  
nineteen counties and with a area as large as the  
State of Mass and R.D combined. at their committee at  
Ogallala encountered me on an inspection of  
irrigation & sound money but as the Park of the  
state is the strong hold of the Pope and the Pope has  
an influence now on the President & I think of the State Irrigation  
Associations or the candidates my church are decidedly aini  
McCull. Cady. Houghland our candidate for the State Senate and  
myself stork out tomorrow for a two weeker trip together over  
the district holding two meetings a day. Cady & Houghland to do  
the speaking and McCull and I the road walking and buttonholing.  
The State Central Comm furnish us with transportation and  
expenses so I am not spending any money on a foreign hope  
or less cause. By advertising fee alone I could probably  
be elected for there is a stampede generally

to every republican who will go over onto the advo-  
cate side and is made a hero of as Mr Senator Teller is  
Colo. but enough of all this let me you much honor enough  
of it at home. I am in hope of getting a situation  
of some kind this Fall in Omaha or Lincoln so that  
we can move to a place where the children can have  
better school and social advantages about the only  
possibility I can hope off is that of a traveling sales-  
man growing on some of the lines we have been  
handling such as them are hundred if not thousands  
of men in this State in precisely the same circumstances  
that I am looking for just such a place I really  
think it will be hard to find. Amy is still at Decatur  
with her Grandmother. I expect to go to Lincoln about  
the last of the month and will stop over at Omaha  
and bring her home she has been away so long  
that Harriet & George have almost forgotten her or  
she hasn't got over missing her. Amy was delighted with the  
school at Decatur got lots of new ideas and it has been  
a great experience for her. June of course misses her  
the most as she has got to be a great help in the kitchen  
in vacation time we are all as well as can be but  
this is about all we have to be thankful for

Write when you can as we enjoy your letter more than any  
they all I know we don't deserve them and it is allowing an  
time to write back which on earth can we write about there  
the possible interests you except possibly ourselfs  
and that is not an interesting subject for one stand fast  
people.

My dear Amy

Your inquiry regard to apples received yesterday we would like the apples but it would be out of the question to ship them so late in the season as this as they would surely freeze on the way and the carriage charge would be too much even if not for the danger of freezing.

We all enjoyed the candy and ginger you sent on Thanksgiving day. George and I the ginger and Jason and the girls the candy. We have been having some terribly cold weather 22 below zero on the Friday after Thanksgiving and a regular blizzard. It has warmed up however and we are now having beautiful weather.

and today the river had overflowed  
out so that we let the water into  
our ditch and are running it  
full. I was not much surprised at  
the results of the election in this state  
the Free Silver crowd had taken full  
possession of many of our farmers  
and the complete fusion of the  
Popes with the democrats together  
with the Brooksbanks and the Silver  
Republinc made it next to impossible  
for an honest money republican  
to be elected. I carried every  
County west of us by good majority  
and my own county by 100 ahead  
of the next highest majority which was  
Mr Cuday for Congress our county  
also went for McKinley by 12 majority  
Cuday receiving 60. I carried Devil's  
Cheyenne Kimball Brown & Scotts Bluff Cos  
and lost Keith Perkins Lincoln & McPherson  
And as I ran some 400 ahead of the  
highest republican on the ticket in the  
district I feel that I did fairly well  
under the circumstances and was only  
beaten by less than 100 majority

on your own acts seem to me it will be more  
convenient for you all in many ways except of course  
it's not home the room and convenience that you have enjoyed  
at Mr Andover. Any arrangement in regard to furnishing or  
remodeling your old place are satisfactory to us  
and Mr Stevens plans seem to me wise and practical.

Mark I had hope to be able to realize out of the place ~~you~~ was  
about or fall down from the taxes and insurance which amounts  
to about 175<sup>00</sup> per year then the interest on what I owe  
you and George to come out over there to pay the annual  
premium on my life insurance policy as follows 48<sup>00</sup> on  
3000.<sup>00</sup> due each yr. in May and 113<sup>00</sup> on 3000<sup>00</sup> ten year  
term policy due in August each year and if any balance

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about what these items amount to. to have such balance to  
apply as my note held by you and George equally. It does  
look now as though there would soon be any chance of our  
being able to live in the old place. And it is going to be  
hard work for us to live comfortably here and make enough  
to pay our debts. What I am trying to do now is to get some  
kind of a situation on a salary as one of us can take care  
of what business there is to attend to in the store and Walter  
never expect or want to live any where else. We have now  
successfully in getting the half section of land on the bottom which  
is in George name to secure his coming to me under irrigation  
and in shape to sell at a price that will pay both him and  
yourself what I owe you. a piece of land not so good and just  
half the size but with some better improvement on it sold the other day  
for \$1000.00 and the purchaser who has lived here ten years and  
knows what he is doing thinks he struck a bargain as I feel that  
the 320 acres with the water right which we have this last year  
developed up to it will be ample sufficient to pay you both

The are of course anxious to get to some town where the  
schools are better than here or as if the children as far as our  
school has been <sup>to</sup> equal to the requirement of any

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but she will soon be old enough and advanced enough  
to require something far more than will be possible to  
afford of our present school house. And besides I have  
to think of her board the other money to grow up with in this  
environment. All our capital has been invested here  
and what we make in town this spring also looks up  
here and the everything that we had invested in depreciating  
from 50 to 90 % and the money probably 75 % of the  
former moving away and everything else generally going  
to smash has had the effect of eating up about every thing we  
had out of course our business is not  $\frac{1}{4}$  what it was  
several years ago. Had the capital to go into the drug  
business in a small way in a good town some where I  
feel that I could get on very well as long as if I could only  
get a situation some where. I realize that if I stay here  
year after year waiting for the condition to change  
I will in time get into ruts and become disengaged  
and give up trying. We have certainly worked hard and faithfully  
here and at first with a good prospect of success and the  
present condition do not seem to be altogether our fault  
except it be in holding on too long. and trying to

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the two mud oak trees. The house has been given  
warm weather ever since Thanksgiving week and  
have been running our ditch full of water for the last  
three weeks and getting lots of our land backed up as  
it never has been before. Since the flood, in order that  
we may be in shape to receive a crop next spring  
and be in condition to keep it growing through the season  
all of the farms under our ditch are delighted with  
the prospects and are expecting a sure crop next  
season in consequence of getting their land so thoroughly  
soaked this winter. I have been quite busy running  
levels for lateral or little ditch from the main ditch  
this morning & when I came work in the field with the  
instrument. George is still improving daily in his walking  
the girls both well as usual. Garrett very enthusiastic over  
the part she is to take in the school Christmas entertainment.  
She is the one the make an actress of nothing with her better  
than the opportunity given her part and receive the applause of the  
audience. Plenty of chance perhaps too much he just the opposite  
of any who is backward about such matters. Jessie  
will add something to the already too long drum roll.
