at home. It is the one strong

busy it would be unbearable.  
Our children, the letter from home,  
business, our stock, books & magazines  
are all, excepting of course Hope.

weather. Hardly any snow and  
has not been cold enough to  
make ice so that we will have

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were we have some exceptionally  
good horse men to work for us  
and are have good success so far  
We have something over two hundred  
head cattle and all are making  
your colt crop from me well,  
as over our 130 acre of Rye  
and winter wheat. if this is a  
good season I do hope some  
of you can come out here  
~~in~~ this summer soon time.

dinner. We all enjoyed your letter  
so much and had a better idea  
of a good many things than we  
had gotten from papers. You must  
have had an exciting time and  
know you enjoyed it all.

Hope you got the fine fall right

for I remembered its being a favorite  
pic of yours. I forgot to say any  
thing about the photographs we  
got some time ago. They are very  
good of all but you, and I guess  
it is because your hair is parted  
and so low on your neck you  
look so old. Abbot and Sale look  
awful cute standing together. Sale  
looks like a girl.

Mother and Father took dinner  
with us yesterday and heard your  
letter too. I will send Agnes back  
as she requested.

Glad to hear Aggie is still feeling  
well and do hope everything will  
come out all right, the time seems  
very short now, how does she look?  
Still growing fleshy? What-will  
George do? I am afraid it will  
use him up.

Our boy is getting awful nice  
has just found his hands today

his eyes have been a little sore  
a couple of days but guess it is  
only from a cold in the head.

Hope you will see him some  
day.

Must close now and try and  
see a little while he is asleep  
Love to all from all.

My dear Amy

I am not going away again without writing to tell you how much we have enjoyed your letter you know I have had the benefit of this even if I did not desire it. It must have been several months since I wrote last, anyway it was before I went on my trip west. In July I went to Chicago with a car load of horses so in that way I unexpectedly saw a little of the Fair, spent three half days and three evenings in the grounds. was surprised to find how cheap it was possible to live closer to the grounds and how much there was to see and hear. I was not so much pleased with the Midway Palance as I expected to be but the Fair proper was so much beyond my comprehension of what was possible for men and women to do in so short a time that I could not bear to spend an hour of my limited time anywhere but in the main grounds and buildings only had about two hours for the "ark Palace" one evening on the Court of Honor during the illumination of the building and ground and the electric fountain is worth

a trip to Chicago if one has to walk. It is a sight  
now to be forgotten. I am very anxious to have  
Jessie go, but am afraid it will not be possible as  
we hardly are now in a position to money. We never  
were so hard pressed for money and it does not  
look now as though money matters would be any  
easier with us until another crop. This season  
crop is a very light one and the prices are so  
unreasonable low that there will be hardly anything  
for the farmers not near enough for them to pay their  
old bills. It will not be possible for us to collect  
much from them for a year yet. We sold so far two car  
loads of horns in Iowa but most of them we had to  
sell at six months time and it was impossible to  
sell the notes. I expect to start south tomorrow or  
next day with a bunch of horns to go over land to  
Indian Territory where we understand there is a demand  
for the class of horns we want to sell. When we despair  
of this bunch we will have nothing left but good deer antler  
horns. I don't like this being away from home so much  
but it can't be helped. Will probably be gone six weeks or  
two months. We take a camp cook fit along so will be independent  
of town or civilization. There will be five in the party.

Am so sorry that we are not going to make this  
year as we had been looking forward to this year as  
the one when we would be most likely to come together.  
George wrote that he intended to be in Chicago next month  
for a few days. Wish he could extend his trip this far  
but it would be too bad to take the time from the Fair and  
I should not advise him to. ~~but~~ The Melrose baby of course  
is a wonder we are expecting a photograph of him which George  
has promised. We can't realize that there is one there  
and will not until we see it. Of course a photo will help. How I wish  
you could all our children as they are so much more interesting and  
handsome than any other you have ever seen. Harriet has got  
to be a beauty and as bright and full of the spirit as she can

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stick just wicked enough to suit Agnes "to a t". George is fat, lousy, and good natured never has the colic or croup and is always good if well fed. Amy is quite a young lady. The girls A & H are out to an afternoon party today given by the daughter of the section foreman a swindle. Mr Chilberg has been with us for a week or so but a week ago yesterday she and Ciller went to Salt Lake to visit relatives for two weeks we expect Mr C to be with us two or three weeks more after her winter trip Joe runs out from Omaha once a week while she is here. Little Joe and Harriett have high times together two or three fights every day but think lots of each other and will play by the hour by themselves. I wish we could have a good long visit from Agnes but it is too much to expect and I don't if it would be a joyable to her for more than a few days or weeks.

Dear Amy - Mother has been over today the first for a month or more as did not have time to add to this, I hate awfully to have John go again. Will write more in a few days.

a little and has very little appetite. The baby  
and I are in the usual robust health as well  
as my self. We had seen the account of Mr.
