

How to Spend a Day in Penang.

Special All-Day Motor Car Excursion 9 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Tourists will be shown the sights and places of interest, have ample time for sea bathing, take photographs, do shopping, visit hotels, drive and stop as they wish.

Morning drive 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. (Or Afternoon Drive.)

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

Dean R. Pound Sir,

Your recent visit of our Judiciary has given me the greatest pleasure. We are much indebted to you for the valuable opinions you imparted to us. But much to my regret I was unable, due to the limit of time, to entertain you so well as I wish to.

The president and the Chief procurator of the high court in Peping just informed me that you had visited the courts and the first prison there. They feel, however, extremely sorry that you, owing to the pressure of time, could not let them hear more of your instructive views.

I have the honour to present you, as a reference to our modern laws and judicial organs, the few english and french copies of our new civil and criminal codes with some photographes of our courts and prisons in the provinces.

I shall be exceedingly grateful, if you would be good enough to disclose your impressions of the present conditions of our Judiciary, thus to show us a way of improvement.
